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Transcript of the Video "Media's Roadmap For Latinas" with Kat Lazo

My mom is actually from Columbia and my father is from Peru. And I was born here which makes me Latina!

A while back, I wrote a blog called A Media Roadmap for Latinas.

Someone who looks like me!" And honestly, I tuned in to see Lizzie McGuire go through her shenanigans, but I really tuned in to see Miranda, because I couldn't believe that someone on TV actually looked like me, she was young like me...

Quick fact – by the way, Miranda actually played a Mexican, when in fact, she was Filipino. No one ever knows what my ethnicity is, so I really related to her in that sense. The next thing I started watching was Degrassi. You know, the first Degrassi, the one with Drake in the wheelchair – that one.

Once again, we have the protagonist, Emma, goody-two shoes, blonde, blue eyed...and her best friend, Manny Santos. Everything was cool, Manny was once again the sidekick best friend, nothing too outlandish. Until we get to Season 3, Episode three "You Got the Look." Oh, did things change there.

Sometimes we do this, but you're taking this a little too far.

To finalize this, now that I'm older, I'm watching shows like "Modern Family." For an adult version of a Latina, who do we have? Sofia Vergara. [Various clips of Sofia Vergara saying "jes" - yes with a Hispanic accent.]

No doubt about it, Sofia is beyond humorous and I love her to pieces, but I think its really funny how we go through this road map and she's supposed to be the adult version of what Latinas are. And of course they make fun of her, and her accent. [More clips of Sofia Vergara and her accent.]

Yet again the focus is on her sexuality. There's a lot of comments are made from men on the show about her race, or how she's stupid, they don't understand her, how she's loud and obnoxious.

My question about all of these portrayals of Latinas in the media, since when did we become the epitome of sexiness? Is it because we look 'ethnic'? Is it because we look foreign to the people who are making the media?

Listen, I'm not saying I'm not sexy and I'm not saying that my fellow Latinas are not sexy, but why are we the epitome of sexiness? Plus, we're much more than just our appearance and we're much more than our sexiness. I'm sorry if I'm sounding a little bit negative, but I am sharing what I've seen growing up in the media.

But I do remember some positive shows featuring people of color such as, "That's So Raven," "The Garcia Brothers" on Nickelodeon, "Sister Sister," "Family Matters," "Smart Guy". These were amazing shows. We're still missing strong female Latina leads. I'm not seeing a lot of that.

If you guys think I'm wrong please let me know, because I'd love to watch it and I'd love to support it.

We have "The Mindy Project." She's an Indian female who's the main character and she's also writing. Something I really want to emphasize, if we want to change the media, we need more diversity not just in front of the camera but behind the camera.

Maybe you're a young Latina female who's watching this and you're as unhappy with the portrayals you're seeing as I was, hey – get to writing! Get to filming. Just make media. If you're unhappy with what you see, change it. No ones going to change it but you.
